Jen is best known for her work on AMC's critical darling **Dietland** as fiery fat activist 'Rubi.' She has also guest appeared on The Blacklist, 30 Rock, The Unbreakable Kimmy Schmidt, Deadbeat, Orange is the New Black, Blue Bloods, Boardwalk Empire, Law & Order: SVU, The Slap, and The Good Wife.

Jen's film credits include a starring role in the indie film Love on the Run with Frances Fisher and Steve Howey, the Warner Brothers film *Going in Style*, and *Chuck* with Liev Schreiber. She also stars in Tessa Slovis' *Pizza Party*, which finished a successful festival run at Geena Davis' prestigious Bentonville Film Festival.

Jen presented her first TEDx talk in 2020, "Hollywood's Fatphobia Problem." She is also a producer and writer with several pilots in development, including a web series. She produced and starred in concept pilots for two of her series--the Sundance Episodic Lab semifinalist Queens of Daytime, and the half-hour comedy The Reunion. Her writing has been solicited by several production companies. She is a regular storyteller for Mortified, hosts the podcasts All The Fucks and Dreading the Boards, and is now the voice of Disney's first plus-size princess in Julie Murphy's Cinderella story, If The Shoe Fits.

If Jen Ponton was already a proponent of feminism and positive body image before she landed the role of Rubi on AMC's new series, *Dietland*. But the actress still sees this #MeToo moment as a turning point for women in entertainment. And she is an active participant in the movement: You can find her tweeting avidly and proudly speaking up about the issues she's passionate about, including gender equality, inclusivity, and sizeism.

II A huge entry question when I'm courting someone for representation is,
"Do you see my career as something that transcends fat girl roles?"

Everybody I have worked with has always believed very firmly in my person virtually being able to tell any story.

Rubi's look is so celebratory of the body that she is lucky enough to inhabit. She is all bright colors, with jewelry and bright make-up, and I think that is such a huge part of who she is and how she channels all that energy and how she knows how to usher Plum into the same place that she occupies.

People are hungry for stories about women, particularly women who don't abide by the beauty norm.

Ponton would like to see actresses of size playing roles that don't use their weight as part of the storyline.

When I think, 'Can I really write this thing, executive produce it and be on it and showrun at the same time?,' I look to someone like [Tina Fey or Marti Noxon].

#### 'Love On The Run' Movie Features A Plus Size Lead Defving Plus Size Stereotypes

What makes this film really special is that it stars a plus size woman without a stereotypical plus size narrative — that is, one that limits the character to hiding, shrinking, or disappearing altogether.

- If you're not going to tell fat stories, then don't tell fat stories (Note: TELL FAT STORIES).
  - But if you're going to tell them, you need to involve actual fat people.
- As a part of AMC's Dietland, it's hard to not pinch myself daily. I've been a fat activist for 10 years, and now being able to affect so many lives in a way I'd only dreamed about for most of my adult life -- that's the dream, for me.

Franny was lovable, upbeat, generous, and full of hope for a better tomorrow. Even more importantly, her lines were miraculously devoid of self-deprecating remarks, body-shaming, or diminishing her self-worth.

I wanted to be the actress I needed when I was younger, when Tracy Turnblad was the only romantic, confident leading lady of size that could be seen...period.
We're in a time where just being a

woman is a political statement. Let alone a fat woman. Let alone a fat woman in a movie; a fat woman in a movie who loves herself; oh, and a fat woman in a movie who loves herself and is also loved and desired by other people.



## Fat Girls Take The Lead

- Dietland joins several body-positive characters I've had the distinct joy of playing--a lascivious duchess on Hulu's Deadbeat, the dreamy ingenue Franny in the film Love on the Run, and now, Addy--the heroine of my new series, Queens of Daytime.
  - With Addy, I wanted to say something new--she just loves herself. Her body is refreshingly plotless. She's come to her industry to do great things, and by golly, she will do them.
- We were enthralled with the opportunity to create a period show that could genuinely be a feel-good experience--for women, for queer folks, for fat folks, for Black folks.
- The more exposure we have to diverse bodies in ertainment, the more we'll be able to look in the mirror and see that same potential in ourselves.





## The Age Of The Fat Heroine: Behind The Scenes With Jen Ponton

- That's the future I wanted to help create. Fat girls telling stories that aren't about being fat girls.
- II I didn't give myself credit for a really long time. I didn't think I could write.

  Here I was, carrying around so much doubt about the worthiness of my stories.
- II In 2018, Ponton teamed up with Emmy-winner Louise Shaffer. *Queens of Daytime* was born--a story set in the live soap operas of 1958, starring fat heroine Addy (Ponton) as the newly-minted producer of a floundering soap opera.
  - There's something so provocative about having a plus-size lead and not talking about her body.



## "Queens of Daytime" Explores Women's Empowerment In The 1950s

Shaffer and Ponton say that the true message of their show is 'the mirage of white feminism.'



It's a term that decries feminist theories focused solely on the struggles of white women, without addressing the myriad of oppressions that face women of color and/or women lacking other social privilege.

The show is a unique celebration of how much has changed since 1958--and a rallying cry of how far we have yet to go. ||
